

PicturesToExe

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Over the years tape/slide (Diaporama) has always been a problem when it came to projection because of the different standards that exist for projectors, tape recorders, etc. Digital cameras and computers have made things easier, but not every computer had PowerPoint and there are several different proprietary, non-compatible, systems.

But now there is a solution!

When I attended the recent Audio-Visual Festival of the Royal Photographic Society they presented their medal to Igor Kokarev from Russia for producing the computer program '**PicturesToExe**'. Normally this medal is given to elderly recipients as a lifetime achievement award, very rarely to someone as young as Igor (who is in his 30s).

It wasn't hard to see why. Almost all the audio-visual presentations at the festival were made using "PicturesToExe" and it has become the system of choice for presentations. Hence the very high regard in which Igor is held.

What is "PicturesToExe"?

Basically it is a sophisticated but affordable and easy-to-use program that enables you to make complex audio-visual presentations and then to save them as an "exe" file that can be used on any computer. No longer is special equipment is needed – all you require is a standard PC with a sound card. Double-click the "exe" file and there you are – 'simples'. The program will also allow you to make Mac compatible files and/or to enable you to burn the presentation on a DVD to play back on your TV.

Igor's company is WNSOFT and he graciously donated a couple of copies of "Pictures to EXE" as prizes for last year's IARC and BARC contests.
